Beth's Girls Survey

EBZEF volunteers Tamara Weiss, doctoral student from the U. of Minnesota, and her colleague Judith Merinyo from Tanzania visited Lumwana West in August 2013 to conduct interviews with Beth's Girls graduates and early withdrawals from the scholarship program. The success of EBZEF's efforts is clear in Tamara's insightful report at www.bethsgirls.org.

Informal discussions with adults living in the village "described a woman's value mostly in terms of their fulfillment of responsibilities to their family. Women were expected to tend to the household (go to the fields to cultivate and gather food, cook, sweep, fetch water, care for children, etc.), provide for the family, bear and care for the children, and tend to the needs of the husband. Marriage and multiple children were idealized for a wife. Unmarried women reportedly experienced isolation or being ostracized from the community."

Tamara notes, "men now desire educated wives and are more likely to mistreat uneducated wives." Educated women earn respect because "they are more competent and capable of contributing to the household income." Beth's Girls now esteem their education differently, seeing it as "a broader triumph in their lives." Beth's Girls value the ways in which "education expands their opportunities in life, their independence, and

their ability to enter into more equitable relationships." One interviewee stated, "an educated husband and wife could share ideas and solve problems together." Another felt "an education would allow her the flexibility to leave a bad marriage because she would be able to secure employment and to provide for her children, regardless of her husband."

Beth's Girls are building their identity as educated women in new ways. After a decade of work in Lumwana West, Zambia, your support of EBZEF's scholarship for women and literacy programs is having "a positive impact on multiple generations." Thank you from both sides of the world! ☺

College Girls Update

Priscovia Sangenjo completes year 2 of a 3-year program at Teachers College in Solwezi. Kutemba Njolomba has begun her 1st year for a Bachelor of Education in Natural Sciences at Copperbelt College of Education. Melba Chitala awaits acceptance to nursing school for 2014.

Justina speaks to her EBZEF sponsors: "First and foremost we thank God for your lives. You have really helped us. We don't know how we were going to manage without you. May God bless you." She advises Beth's Girls: "Girls, we are capable of doing anything because the power is in our hands. Remember, when you educate a girl child, you educate the whole world. God loves us. Let's work hard." ☺

Mary Donates to Beth's Girls

EBZEF's first Beth's Girl, Mary Lundeba, as the Aquaculture Project Manager for the Ministry of Agriculture in Angola, is the first scholarship recipient to contribute financially to the scholarship fund. She insists, "even a man who doesn't know where he is going to ought to know where he has come from! I know where I have come from and so this project [EBZEF] is upon my heart. Whenever I have a little something I will always remember my roots."

Mary says, "the legacy of Elizabeth Bowers, wanting to give a helping hand to the less privileged, and bringing about economic and social development, still moves on! Now across the Zambian borders to Angola where Aquaculture has not taken off yet, I have successfully established the first fish farm and am now working on the second. It gives a good feeling to see the results of my work!" ☺

Help EBZEF Make New Connections to Build Secondary School

Over 5,200 children in the Lumwana West area have no access to a local high school (grades 10-12). As Zambia moves to a 5-year high school system, education beyond grade 7 requires children as young as 13 to attend boarding school 54 miles away. It costs more than a family's annual income to board one child. In 2003, only 4 girls from the village went to school beyond grade 7; since then, EBZEF has supported over 300 girls through secondary school. **Opportunities for continued education will disappear for most children in Lumwana West unless a secondary school can be brought to the village.**

EBZEF Organizes Fund-Raising

EBZEF, in partnership with the Lumwana West community, is seeking funding, equipment and expertise to build a secondary school in the village. Zambia's Ministry of Education has committed to make this a reality, supported by Lunda tribal High Chief Sai'lunga's generous grant of land for the school. Our main development partners—World Vision, Engineers Without Borders, and Peace Corps—are ready to lend their support. EBZEF has developed a comprehensive Secondary School Concept Proposal available at www.bethsgirls.org.

An EBZEF Board member work group is identifying additional potential project partners and funding sources. We are creating a communications plan to contact and follow up with prospective organizations and individuals. Large donations would be wonderful,

but we are also looking at foundations, businesses or corporate sponsors who might fund specific parts of the project, such as water/sanitation facilities, classrooms, teacher housing, or a solar energy system. We are looking at potentially interested individuals, corporate givers, and companies in the U.S. and Zambia.

EBZEF invites widespread participation from groups and individuals at all levels of this project. Other charities and non-governmental organizations (NGOs) with similar interests may be willing to lend their experience and expertise to assist the project. Zambian diaspora around the world can offer valuable ideas, skills and support. A prominent American, Zambian, or global celebrity could provide high visibility support for such an educational effort.

New Teaching Materials for Pre-School

Land Grant from High Chief

Village headmen, World Vision ADP Manager Riversage Nzala, plus EBZEF volunteers Tamara Weiss, Judith Merinyo, and Michael Rhodes visited Lunda High Chief Sai'lunga in his remote palace to accept a grant of traditional tribal lands on which to build the new Lumwana West secondary school. Chief Sai'lunga granted 10 hectares (25 acres) to the village, ten times the amount required by the Ministry of Education, to support agricultural studies experimentation.

The next step is a government survey for demarcation of the land. Then a site plan plus the High Chief's letter of documentation will be submitted to the District Land Council in Mwinilunga (Provincial Department). The final Title Deed comes from the Zambian government. ☺

Library Updates

Zambia/Africa Library Collection Grows

EBZEF Board member Fordson Kafweku and volunteer Sandu Matthews from the University of Zambia negotiated student prices to double the number of volumes in the Zambia/Africa collection of the Memorial Library.

Matthews researched and selected books to build the Zambia collection, including volumes of *African Social Research*, *Social Policy and Human Development in Zambia*, *State-Civil Society and Donor Relations in Zambia*, *Education Denied*, *Reaction to Colonialism*, *History of Child Labor in Zambia*, *Country of the Mind: Poems from Zambia*, and more. Zambian literary voices are now present in the Memorial Library. ☞

EWB Project Report

EWB Project Manager Lisa Dukes reports that stem wall construction of the new science lab is now underway. She notes "the well near the high school, where the crew had planned to draw water for the concrete mixing, was not sufficiently productive, so a repair to the well was funded by EWB." Next comes the foundation slab, the construction of the brick walls, and completion of the roof work. Other EWB engineers, called the "Water Group," are considering latrine design (possibly composting) plus a new well for the secondary school. ☞
