### Beth's Girls' Progress

EBZEF scholarship recipients in 2009 total 72 including 29 new girls in grade 8 and 26 in 9th at Lumwana West Basic School. Mwinilunga High School has 5 Beth's Girls in 10th, 7 in 11th, and 5 in 12th. Kutemba Njolomba and Jennipher Mukwakwa continue to do well at Mukenge Girl's School. As of 2009 Solwezi Technical High School no longer accepts female students. The need for secondary schools is great.

Of the entering 8th grade class, ages range from 12 to 22. The number of children in their families range from 2 to 14. Two of the girls are orphans while another's father has two wives. Only nine of the girls have both parents. Many live with grandparents, aunts, uncles, and older siblings. Most of the parents in the village are subsistence farmers.

Beth's Girls study English, math, environmental science, geography, civics, history, religious education, and the Lunda language of their tribe. Their activities include playing netball and soccer, reading, cooking, chess, and going to church. Most girls have extensive chores after school at home. The village has no electricity or light for studying after dark.

Few, if any, of the girls would be attending school without your support. As Aggy Mwalimu (15) says, "Education to me is life, so your support makes me to survive." Prisca Mupatayi (23) insists, "To what I know, education is a way of the best solution to someone's difficulties. It is the only key to success." Christabel Mashau (17) realizes that "My dream for the future is to finish my education in order for me to become someone in the future." These dreams are now possible.

Beth's Girls realize that the future lies open to them in ways it could not without your help. "When I complete school I want

to be a teacher and help others" says Olivia Meleki (15). Mary Moloshi (12) tells us "When I complete my secondary school I want to be a nurse." Mildred Mwenya (13) dreams, "After finishing school, I would like to be a journalist because I like the job very much." Such dreams could not be possible without your generosity to EBZEF.

Mildred continues, "My dream for the future is to complete my education and get a better job so that I will come and look after my grandparents as well as all the family and the nation at large." Helping women to help their own community is where your contributing efforts lead. Josline Sangungula (13) speaks for all Beth's Girls, "My dream is to complete school to develop the area of Lumwana. Let me thank you for the good things you are doing for the Lumwana girls."

Following Prudence's lead, three of Beth's Girls high school graduates now pursue tertiary certificates. Dianah Masumbah is in a two-year program for teachers at Solwezi College of Education. Sandra Kamulosu is in a one-year Secretarial and Office Management course at Solwezi Trades

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Training Institute. "I promise I will make it," she insists. Angela Kasongo is in a one-year program for the Advance Certificate in Food Production at the Hotel & Tourism Training Institute in Lusaka.

All three women are doing well and enjoying their studies. This is a major step forward in helping Beth's Girls to prepare for the future. Your generosity is making their success possible.

"The encouragement that the secondary girls are giving to the community is spreading. Beth's Girls are models in Lumwana West, in Mwinilunga, and in the NW Province."

## Life Skills

PCV Jessica Hillsley facilitated the first Life Skills Program for Beth's Girls and their parents in Lumwana West. Nineteen facilitators, including 12 teachers and 7 Girls' Club leaders, worked with 50 girls and their families to explore pregnancy issues, HIV/ AIDS, assertiveness training, gender roles, self-esteem, and much more.

Brother Mizhi Kakoma, from PC Lusaka staff, and Regina McLauren, PC Volunteer Leader from the Southern Province, led an initial 2-day Training of Trainers (TOT) session for the facilitators. The 4-day Life Skills Workshop followed with nearly 150 people participating. At least 70 people were tested for HIV/ AIDS at the end of the session.

Jessica reports that "Everyone seemed to agree that they were there to give the girls a vision and to ensure that their scholarships were not being wasted. Parents hoped they could help empower the girls and make them more

assertive." Jessica's own dream was that, following such a program, it would now be "Zambians teaching Zambians!" "One thing I learned in Zambia," she says, "is that you cannot educate one person and expect a change. It takes a community to change things, and Zambians are all about community."

The Lumwana West community is invited to apply for another mini-grant from Peace Corps next year to offer a Life Skills workshop to the village again, this time including the boys as well.

## Library Dedication Trip

Linda and Gerry Bowers will visit Zambia in July 2009 to attend the dedication of the Elizabeth Bowers Memorial Library in Lumwana West on July 9th. The library is a gift from EBZEF to Beth's Girls and to the village community. The project was initiated as a Peace Corps Partnership Program by PCV Bob Wilder in 2006 and carried forward by the community, EBZEF, and PCV Jessica Hillsley. Headmaster Mbongo Njolomba, the Lumwana West Library Committee, and the people of the village have worked very hard to see the project through to completion.

Dignitaries attending the ceremony will include Lunda Chief Sailung'a, the village headmen, representatives from Peace Corps, World Vision Zambia, the District Education Office, the District Administrator, and The Provincial Education Office. The Library brings the village one step closer to their dream of having a secondary school at Lumwana West.

Elizabeth Rachel Bowers (1979-2002) shared her compassionate spirit with the people of NW Zambia as a Peace Corps volunteer. The Scholarship legacy sustains Beth's vision of service and global awareness by empowering young women to build positive change from within, to become leaders and educators, and to improve the quality of life in their communities. 🌿

I first met Beth as an incoming mountain wilderness student at Earlham College in 1997. We were both in the gear room, and I had been issued a long sleeping bag that I was unsuccessfully trying to jam into a stuff sack. Beth saw my struggle, offered to help, and within a minute had it packed neatly. She passed it back to me with a big smile. My jaw dropped. I knew then that Beth was a force to be reckoned with.

Beth was always laughing or teasing, yet she possessed a profound sense of stillness and centeredness. She was playful, passionate, and full of life—a bright energy fed by her ability to know herself and be grounded in a way so incredibly solid, allowing her a keen insight into others.

Beth had such a sense of adventure. She was always off exploring and taking new risks,

whether that was skydiving or spending junior year in Japan. . . . She was so excited about the Peace Corps—so excited to travel, explore, give back, learn and grow. The night before she flew out of Atlanta to Johannesburg she was talking excitedly of bungee jumping off Victoria Falls after her service in Africa.

Beth's dad said the night her spirit passed a great wind came into the city and then left. And so Beth continues to explore—sailing along, stirring up thunderstorms, rushing down Victoria Falls, chasing fall leaves, and soothing living beings, bringing her beauty and light to all she encounters. It is a beauty and light I was blessed to have known, one I will miss dearly, but one that continues to inspire the world we live in. 🌿
