NOTICE OF SALE OF BONDS

Sealed proposals will be received at the office of the Village of Amanda, Ohio, until 12 o'clock noon on March 1st 1929, for the purchase of SEVENTEEN THOUSAND SIX HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$17,600.00) worth of Bonds of said Village.

These bonds are issued in accordance with and under the Laws of Ohio, and pursuant to Ordinance No. 96 duly passed on the 15th day of September 1928. Said bonds shall be numbered consecutively from one to twenty inclusive, and shall be in the denominations as follows: Bond No. 1 in the sum of SIX HUNDRED DOLLARS, Bonds Nos. 2, 3, 4, 6, 7, 8, 10, 11, 12, 14, 15, 16, 18, 19 and 20 each in the sum of ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS, Bonds Nos. 5, 9, 13, and 17 each in the sum of FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS.

Said bonds shall be dated October 1st, 1928 and shall bear interest at the rate of six per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, on the first day of April and October of each year.

Said bonds shall mature as follows:

Both principal and interest shall be payable when due at the office of The Farmers & Merchants Bank Co., in the Village of Amanda, Ohio.

Said bonds are issued in anticipation of the collection of special assessments and to pay the Village portion for the improving of Main Street in the Village of Amanda, Ohio.

Bids for said bonds may be submitted based upon their bearing a different rate of interest, provided that where such fractional rate of interest is bid, such fraction shall be one-quarter of one per cent or multiples thereof.

Bids shall be sealed and marked "Bid for Main Street Bonds"

Bids shall state the gross amount they shall pay for the bonds, the accrued interest to the date of delivery, and premium on said bonds, the rate of interest, whether the bidder or the Village shall bear the expense of printing the bonds.

A certified check for 5% of the amount of the bonds bid for, payable to the Clerk, must accompany each bid.

Ordinance No. XV. To regulate the selling, furnishing or giving away of intoxicating liquors as a beverage and to regulate the place where intoxicating liquors are sold, furnished or given away as a beverage. Be it ordained by the council of the village of Amanda in Fairfield county, Ohio:

Section, 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons, to sell, furnish or give away intoxicating liquors as a beverage, on any day of the week between the hour of nine o'clock P.M. central standard time of any day and six o'clock A.M. central standard time of the next succeeding day:

Section, 2. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to sell, furnish or give away intoxicating liquors as a beverage on the first day of the week commonly called Sunday.

Section, 3. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to cause, permit or allow any place where intoxicating liquors are sold furnished or given away as a beverage, to be or remain open on any day of the week between the hours of nine o'clock P.M. central standard time of any day and six o'clock A.M. central standard time of the next succeeding day.

Section, 4. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to cause, permit or allow any place where ^{on} other days of the week than the first, commonly called Sunday, intoxicating liquors are sold, furnished or given away as a beverage, to be or remain open on the first day of the week commonly called Sunday.

Section, 5. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons who keep, aid or assist in keeping a place where intoxicating liquors are sold furnished or given away as a beverage, to have, allow, permit or maintain a wine room in connection therewith such wine room being a place or room immediately adjoining a place where intoxicating liquors are sold or furnished as a beverage, and to which said liquors are carried for the purpose of being drunk.

It shall be unlawful for any person or persons who keep or aid or assist in keeping a place where intoxicating liquors are sold, furnished or given away as a beverage to receive any payment for intoxicating liquors sold as a beverage by them in said room or place in billiard, or pool checks, or anything whatsoever other than money.

Section, 8. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons who keep, aid or assist in keeping a place where intoxicating liquors are sold, furnished or given away as a beverage to have, allow or permit any piano, mandolin, guitar, or other musical instrument to be played in such room or place.

Section, 9. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons who keep aid or assist in keeping a place where intoxicating liquors are sold, furnished or given away as a beverage to have, allow or permit any graphophone, phonograph or other instrument of like nature to be used or operated in such room or place.

Section, 10. That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to sell furnish, or give away intoxicating liquors, as a beverage except in a room fronting on a public street and upon the first or ground floor of the building wherein located, having in front transparent glass windows, so situated and of such size and clearness as to give a full view to persons passing along or standing on the sidewalk or ground adjacent to and in front of such building on such street, of all the interior of said room, And the owner, keeper or person in charge of said room or place, shall on the first day of the week commonly called Sunday and on all other days between the hours of 9 o'clock P.M. of any day, and six o'clock A.M. of the next day immediately following, remove or cause to be removed all screens, partitions, stained or smoked glass or other

substances placed or allowed to remain in or about said Ale, Beer or Porter House, or other places where intoxicating liquors are sold, furnished or given away as a beverage which obstructs a full view of the interior of said room or place, and keep ^{all} such obstructions so placed so that they, or any of them, during the aforesaid times, shall not obstruct the view as aforesaid. And the owner or keeper or person in charge of such room, shall keep burning in such room or place between the hours of 9 o'clock P.M. of any day and six o'clock A.M. of the day next immediately following, a light sufficiently brilliant to light every part of such room or place, so that the passerby or person standing in front of said room or place can see by light plainly enough to designate what persons may be in any part of said room or place.

Section, 11. It shall be unlawful for any person or person who keeps or aids or assists in keeping a place where intoxicating liquors are sold, furnished or given away as a beverage, to maintain or permit or allow a restaurant, pool or billiard room to be connected or operated in such room or place or to permit or allow a restaurant pool or billiard room to be connected directly with said room or place where intoxicating liquors are sold furnished or given away as a beverage.

Section, 12. Any person or persons violating any of the provisions of the preceding sections of this ordinance shall, on conviction thereof, for the first offense be fined not less than twenty five dollars \$25.00 nor more than one hundred dollars, \$100.00 and the costs of prosecution and for any subsequent offense shall be fined not less than fifty dollars, \$50.00 nor more than two hundred dollars \$200.00 and the costs of prosecution.

Section, 13. The phrase "intoxicating liquors" as used in this ordinance shall be construed to mean any distilled, malt, vinous or any intoxicating liquors; but nothing in this ordinance shall be construed to prevent the selling of intoxicating liquors at retail by a regular druggist for exclusively human

medicinal, pharmaceutical, scientific, mechanical or sacramental purposes; and when sold for medicinal purposes it shall be sold only in good faith upon a written prescription, issued and dated in good faith by a reputable physician in active practice and the prescription used but once. The words "giving away" where they occur in this ordinance shall not apply to the giving away of intoxicating liquors by a person in his private dwelling, unless such private dwelling is a place of public resort. And nothing contained in any of the sections of this ordinance shall in any manner affect the right of any manufacturer of intoxicating liquors from the raw materials to sell, deliver and furnish his product in wholesale quantities to bona fide retail dealers trafficking in intoxicating liquors or in wholesale quantities to any party or parties residing outside of the limits of said municipality.

Section, 14. The provisions of this ordinance, as expressed in sections one to ten, are hereby declared to be independent of one another, and not interdependent; and the repeal or abrogation of any section, phrase or clause of this ordinance shall not be held to affect any other part of this ordinance.

Section, 15. This ordinance shall take effect from and after the earliest period allowed by law.
