Consumer Complaints

Attorney General Lisa Madigan announced her office's annual top 10 consumer complaints for 2016 that again show consumer debt and identity theft ranked as the top concerns.

Madigan's office received 23,735 complaints in 2016. For the ninth year in a row, consumer debt ranked as the top complaint, with 2,783 complaints involving issues such as mortgage lending, abusive debt collection practices and predatory payday loans. Number two on the list also for the ninth year in a row is identity theft, with 2,391 complaints.

Education-related complaints now rank number six, jumping a notch from last year's list and reflecting the student loan debt crisis. About 44 million Americans grapple with more than \$1.4 trillion in student loan debt and many borrowers face issues with loan servicers and for-profit schools.

Brain Research and Studying

There is always the question: How to pace yourself to retain the most information? This can be with any number of scenarios, whether it's cramming for a test, making up for wasted time, or trying to master something you don't find very interesting.

An unusual piece of research is being performed by Keisuke Fukuda, a professor in the University of Toronto's Department of Psychology. He was raised in Japan, where there is very little use of electives. His experience in high school made him begin thinking: there must be a better way or at least a more logical way to study, than he had been trained. He found it extremely hard to study the subjects he did not enjoy yet he was forced to take, such as Math and English.

The professor's research is trying to

understand the learning process -- why the brain has a great ability to store information, yet sometimes we forget where we put our keys or park the car. I think we all live with situations like that. I can recall the sequence of all the battles of the American Civil War, but don't remember what I had for lunch. I am glad to hear that Professor Fukuda says that this is normal, not just a Senior Moment.

He uses a scalp electroencephalogram technology that is like a huge beanie with electrodes that monitor electrical activity. It makes me think about the kids using the aluminum foil in the movie "Signs". But their subjects are given different exercises and use a computer to review the brain waves. Professor Fukuda has concluded that his research indicates it is best results is to focus on a large amount of information for shorter bits of time -- like milliseconds -- can be more effective than mulling over smaller amounts of material for longer duration. He states it is much more effective to study 20 minutes a day every day than to study an hour or more a day. Why? That's the way the brain works.

This may be useful to some of you. For those who are in a situation where this is needed, you might want to look up the Professor's study. Kids, when Mom says I used to study two hours a night, she was probably wasting her time.

IEMA Predicts Severe Weather


The Illinois Emergency Management Agency encourages people to stay aware of local forecasts and be prepared to act quickly if storm warnings are issued.

Cyber Security Training Program

Mayor Rahm Emanuel, officials from the U.S. Department of Defense and City Colleges of Chicago announced a new cyber security training initiative to prepare students for skilled jobs.

The initiative makes CCC the first community colleges system in the nation to adopt a high-quality training module from the U.S. military.

The U.S. Department of Defense joined CCC to pilot the new cyber security boot camp this spring, modeled after the intensive, six-month course prototyped with government personnel at Fort McNair, Washington, D.C.

The first cohort of cyber security apprentices at CCC will be a mix of service members and civilians. Those completing the boot camp will sit

for the Offensive Security Certified Professional Certification Test.

Careers in cyber security account for more than 10 percent of all IT jobs.

The \$1.5 million cooperative investment by the City of Chicago and the Department of Defense is a down payment on the pilot and development of a credit-bearing pathway at CCC. Mayor Emanuel will leverage the federal commitment by investing \$1 million from property tax rebate funds to support the program.

Wilbur Wright College, where the boot camp and developing cyber security pathway will be housed, is designated as Center of Excellence for IT education. The college already offers associate degree and certificate programs in IT that include computer science, networking systems and technology, web development.

Several corporate leaders in the IT industry including Accenture, Allstate, Aon, ComEd, Keeper Security and Microsoft, have committed to providing a range of supports, including: internship opportunities, ongoing mentoring, recruitment and job placement, and advise on curriculum development. Chicago will identify internship opportunities to meet its own internal IT needs, and to foster a pipeline that will help boot camp completers connect with jobs in the field upon certification.

Urban Waterways Forum In Chicago

19 Mayors from around the world will attend urban waterways forum in Chicago on March 13th.

The event, which is co-hosted by World Business Chicago and Chicago Council on Global Affairs, is designed to foster an international conversation about the future of urban waterways.

The first discussion will focus on economic opportunity and will be moderated by Bruce Katz, the inaugural centennial scholar at the Brookings Institution. This session will focus on innovative ways cities are approaching economic development with an eye on nontraditional uses of their waterways and how issues of social equity play into these efforts. The second will focus on environmental protection, and will be moderated by Mark Watts, Executive Director of C40 Cities Climate Leadership Group. This session will concentrate on projects around the world utilizing waterways to push environmental efforts critical to cities in the 21st century. Jeanne Gang, Founding Principal of Studio Gang and Anders Bringdal, Founder & CEO of SeaBubbles, will

also participate in the second discussion.

Urban waterways - whether on rivers, lakes, seas or oceans - have always been natural centers of gravity. For thousands of years, cities around the world were built around bodies of water, first because they are a critical resource and later because they sustain trade and commerce. Transportation and manufacturing have evolved and the old industrial waterways that turned into unused land are again ripe for new design, development and purpose.

Completed and planned waterways redevelopment projects are underway in Chicago, Paris and cities around the world that elevate the questions with which global city leaders are grappling as they prioritize their investments.

In Chicago, the recently extended 1.25 mile Riverwalk and the completion of a fourth boat house along the Chicago River demonstrates the Mayor's commitment to increase access to and recreational opportunities on the river, as outlined in both his *Building on Burnham plan* and *Our Great Rivers*.

Army Recruiting Plans Increase

U.S. Army leaders announced the need for 6,000 additional active-duty recruits and 1,500 additional Army Reserve recruits by the end of September.

U.S. Army Recruiting Command will see the largest in-year mission increase in the command's history, brining the original mission of 62,500 to 68,500. This will increase the mission of the Minneapolis Army Recruiting Battalion, based on Ft. Snelling, from 885 combined active duty Army and Army Reserve contracts to 1,013 combined active duty and Army Reserve contracts. The increase of 128 contracts for fiscal year 2017 will fall over the Minneapolis Army Recruiting Battalion's territory which includes all of Minnesota, Iowa, North Dakota and South Dakota as well as part of Wisconsin, Wyoming, Nebraska and Illinois.

The Army has added \$200 million to incentive bonuses, fully opened enlistment to those who have served previously to assist with the increase, and increased the number of two-year enlistment opportunities.

The Army's standards for quality will not change. Currently, only 29 percent of youth meet the physical and mental qualifications required for military service.
