## New Fall Fest At Lincoln Park Zoo



Annual Fall Fest at Lincoln Park Zoo will take a one-year hiatus with the hopes of returning in 2021. This year's festivities will not include hard rides (Ferris wheel, Pines Revenge, etc.) or inflatable attractions (pumpkin bounce house, obstacle course, etc.). Zoo favorites, such as the AT&T Endangered Species Carousel and Lionel Train Adventure, will also remain closed.

New experiences include the Pumpkin Walk, a path through Pritzker Family Children's Zoo (one \$3 ticket required for entry), and Patch's Pumpkin Bar & Grill, a fall-themed pop-up at Bird's Eye Bar & Grill. Longtime favorites are live professional pumpkin carvers (Saturdays only, as part of the Pumpkin Walk), festive snacks, and pumpkin patch.

Reservations for Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays are released on the preceding Sunday at 4 p.m.; reservations for Fridays, Saturdays, Sundays, and Mondays are released on the preceding Thursday at 4 p.m.

Pumpkin Walk tickets are \$3 and must be purchased in advance. All guests over the age of 12 months must have a ticket, and guests under the age of 16 must be accompanied by an adult.

Professional pumpkin carvers will showcase their talents from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. each Saturday through October 31st.

The zoo and all experiences will remain open

rain or shine. Pumpkin Walk tickets can be transferred between people, but all tickets are non-refundable. Fall experience tickets expire on Nov. 1st.

Zoo reservations are non-transferable. The name on the reservation must match the guest to ensure accuracy in case of the need for contact tracing.

The festive fun will take place across zoo grounds; however, all animal buildings will be closed.

Parking is not included in zoo reservation or Pumpkin Walk ticket; however, paid parking is available.

## Second Wave Of Covid-19 In City

The City of Chicago sounded the alarm on the worrying trends across COVID-19 health metrics, including a significant rise in cases, positivity rate and hospitalizations.

Over the past two weeks, cases have risen by more than 50%, to over 500 per day. This is the most cases per day seen in Chicago since late May.

Hospitalizations are also up 25% for non-ICU COVID patients.

To combat this second wave, Mayor Lightfoot is calling on all residents to wear masks and strictly limit social gatherings.

In a gathering of only 10 people, there is a 14% chance that someone is currently infected with COVID-19.

To further fight the spread of COVID-19, the city is considering additional measures in the coming days, including bringing back restrictions on businesses.

## Sewer Project For Brighton Park

The Department of Water Management will launch a new Sewer Main project in Brighton Park during early November.

Sewer upgrade installation is scheduled for the following: along 44th st. from Western to Fairfield and on Maplewood, Campbell, and Artesian from 45th st. to the first alley north of 45th st., and along 45 st. from Artesian to Western ave.

## Voter Guidance For 2020 Election

The COVID-19 pandemic has changed the way many individuals will exercise their right to vote, and Attorney General Kwame Raoul released new online guidance to help people understand their rights during the 2020 general election.

The Attorney General's "Guidance for Illinois Voters: 2020 Election" is available online as a resource for Illinois voters on election laws and their voting rights. This year, the Illinois General Assembly amended some election statutes in order to protect voters during the COVID-19 pandemic. Raoul's online guidance provides access to accurate, reliable election information to answer questions regardless of whether people vote by mail or in person.

"The right to participate in our nation's democracy is one of the most fundamental rights we have as Americans, and with the General Election already underway in the midst of an unprecedented public health pandemic, it is more important than ever that Illinois residents have a clear understanding of their rights as voters," Raoul said. "My office is issuing 'Guidance for Illinois Voters: 2020 Election' so that voters can access comprehensive election information to help them select the voting method that best meets their needs."

"Guidance for Illinois Voters: 2020 Election" is designed to walk voters through various steps in

the process and answer potential questions. People can access basic information to identify and contact local election authorities and the Illinois State Board of Elections, and determine whether they are registered to vote.

Additionally, the guidance details important remaining deadlines and procedures for those who have not yet registered to vote or applied to vote by mail.

It also answers questions people may have about voting by mail, voting early, or public safety measures they will encounter at polling places.

The Legislature expanded voting by mail due to the pandemic, and the guidance describes the ways in which a mail-in ballot can be submitted, whether by the U.S. Postal Service, using a designated drop-box, or in person.

The guidance also informs voters that the Illinois Department of Public Health has implemented health practices to keep polling places safe during early voting and on Election Day.

Voters should be prepared for new protocols established by local election authorities, such as physical distancing at polling places.

People who vote in person should be aware that only authorized individuals are allowed inside polling places.

Individuals who believe they are the victim of fraud related to voting should call the hotline at 1-800-386-5438.


There he presides over non-jury civil trials, hears and decides motions, and conducts settlement conferences.

### Waitlist Opens For Housing Vouchers

The Housing Authority of Cook County (HACC) announced it will accept applications for its Housing Choice Voucher (HCV) Program waitlist for the first time since 2001. Formerly known as Section 8, the HCV Program provides subsidies to income-eligible households to assist with rental payments in the private rental market.

"Decent housing is a basic human right and through the Housing Choice Voucher Program, we are providing an invaluable resource to low-income families," said HACC Executive Director Richard Monocchio.

Applications will be accepted until Nov. 2nd. The vouchers subsidize the difference between 30% of a household's total monthly income and the cost of that household's rent, are available to all households whose incomes are less than 50% of the area's median income (AMI) according to family size.

Income eligibility threshold ranges from \$31,850 for a single individual to \$60,100 for a household of eight.

The subsidy is portable and can be used to rent any qualifying rental unit within HACC's jurisdiction, which includes Chicago and most of suburban Cook County.

The waitlist will have 10,000 spots for new applicants and must be submitted through its online portal at [myportal.the-hacc.org](http://myportal.the-hacc.org) by Nov. 2nd. Paper applications will not be accepted.

After the close of this period, all applications will be screened and a computer-generated random lottery will select 10,000 eligible applicants for the waitlist. Only one application per household will be accepted.

Applicants who need assistance can contact the HACC at (312) 517-2388.

### CPS Schedules Testing Dates

Last school year, current Chicago Public School 12th-grade students were unable to take the PSAT/NMSQT in the fall due to the work stoppage and the SAT in the spring due to COVID-19. As a result, these students do not have a college-reportable SAT score, have yet to meet the state testing requirement for graduation, and were unable to qualify for the National Merit Scholarship. To support these students, the Illinois State Board of Education is funding optional SAT administrations with essay on Oct. 27th.

Eligible grade 12 students may participate in one of the dates this fall or the regularly scheduled SAT day on April 13th, 2021. Current test dates for 11th-grade students to take the PSAT/NMSQT test are Oct. 29th and Jan. 26th.

The Department of Children and Family Services enhanced and streamlined its online reporting system and optimized its website for easier submissions through mobile phones to make reporting allegations of neglect and abuse easier for the public and mandated reporters.

**Online Reporting For Child Abuse**

The site has improved entry fields, clearer instructions and fewer necessary clicks, reducing the time required to make reports and providing a convenient alternative to calling the 24-hour hotline.

During the early months of the coronavirus pandemic while families were secluded at home, children were less likely to be seen by other adults, including mandated reporters such as teachers. Less than 50% of reports of suspected child abuse and neglect were reported in April 2020 compared to April 2019.

Now that schools welcomed students back either in person or virtually, that trend is reversing. Reports to DCF's have increased, with September 2020 remaining about 18% below 2019.

Online reports through the enhanced site have quickly increased since its launch, with 434 online reports in the last full week of September compared to 173 filed during the same time in 2019.

The Illinois Department of Public Health reported 3,714 new confirmed cases of coronavirus disease (COVID-19) in Illinois, including 41 additional deaths.

Cook County fatalities were 1 female 50s, 1 female 60s, 1 male 70s, 1 female 80s and 1 male 80s

IDPH is reporting a total of 350,875 cases, including 9,277 deaths, in 102 counties. The preliminary seven-day statewide positivity for cases as a percent of total test from October 13 - October 19 is 5.5%.

Laboratories have reported 59,077 specimens for a total of 6,883,314. 2,261 people in Illinois were reported to be in the hospital with COVID-19. Of those, 489 patients were in the ICU and 195 patients with COVID-19 were on ventilators.
